Dear families,

The DfE has been going through their procurement system in order to secure a new contractor who will hopefully, complete the building project. Due to the legalities around this, this takes a bit of time, however, the DfE is currently reviewing the remaining project with a prospective company.

I would like to reassure you that delays with the building works will not impact negatively on the children's learning experiences, in fact, quite on the contrary. We are currently reviewing our provision for all areas of the curriculum, to ensure that our children continue to get the absolute best!

At APSOL we teach a full curriculum, including weekly music and computing sessions. We have all the equipment required for these lessons at school, the only difference between our school and others is teaching in a classroom rather than in a hall or specialist room. We are also able to provide a wide offer of clubs even with our limited space.

PE & Sports arrangements from next term (after spring break):

Year 2 - weekly swimming on Mondays.

Year 3 - From Friday 19th April, year 3 will have their weekly PE lesson at the Wandle Recreation Centre.

Achieving Bronze: Rights Committed means there is evidence that:


- APSOL has introduced the RRSA Three Strands into our school community

Computing Curriculum at APSOL

Music Curriculum - what is each class learning?

Reception:

Skills:

Learning to tell the difference between pitches and labelling them with solfege syllables; so, mi and la. Clapping or marching to a beat and changing tempo together.

Taking turns in call and response songs.

Reading pitches from a 3-line stave.

Reading rhythms using Takadimi syllables; crotchets and quavers.

Songs:

Boom Chicka Boom Little Sally Waters Good Night, Sleep Tight Just Like Me

Year 1:

Skills:

Learning the full pentatonic scale in solfege; do, re, mi, so and la.

Reading rhythms using Takadimi syllables; crotchets, quavers, semiquavers, minims and rests.

Singing in 2-part rounds to develop harmony singing. Reading pitches from a 3-line stave.

Transcribing simple songs by ear.

Learning simple tunes on the glockenspiel.

Songs:

Star Light, Star Bright Who Stole The Cookie? The Grand Old Duke Of York Here Comes A Bluebird



Skills:

Learning the full pentatonic scale in solfege; do, re, mi, so and la. Playing the notes G, A, B and E on the recorder.

Using their recorders to compose simple tunes to lyrics, then writing down those melodies on a stave. Singing in 2-part rounds to develop harmony singing. Reading pitches from a 3-line stave. Reading rhythms using Takadimi syllables; crotchets, quavers, semiquavers, minims and rests.

Songs: Kookaburra Good News Hot Cross Buns Kumala Vista

Year 3

Skills:

Playing Samba instruments in unison as a class. Layering different rhythms with different kinds of percussion.

Building the structure of a Samba piece; arrival, samba, break and finish.

Following commands and signals of the band leader. Learning the full pentatonic scale in solfege; do, re, mi, so and la.

Songs:

We have been working through the Samba pieces from Andy Gleadhill's 'Brazilian Samba' book.

How to help your child with reading and developing a love for reading

Top Tips

How to help your child with reading at home

This reading doesn't just have to be their reading book, although that's a great start. Also, reading doesn't stop once we know all the letters and sounds – read with your child for as long as they will let you. All types of reading are useful – try as many as you can, for example:

- Start with your child's reading scheme book. These books will improve reading skills at the just the right level to give challenge and practise. Moving up through the colours or levels can be very important to children and this will help them progress
- Try and read other books at the same level as your child's reading book. Look at Reading with Oxford or our free ebook library for inspiration
- Follow your child's natural interest and look up information on the internet. They won't notice that they are practising their reading. They will also be practising vital retrieval and research skills
- Some children just prefer non-fiction. Reading non-fiction is a great way to improve vocabulary, learn how to tackle new words, improve knowledge and develop a love for reading. Joke books, fact books, top ten books are all just as good for learning to read as reading fiction
- Many children love graphic novels or comics. These are great for developing imagination. Children also learn how stories are presented in different ways and understand how pictures and text work together. There's also quite a bit of reading between the lines needed here
- Read signs and information boards as you are out and about. These often contain new vocabulary to discuss. Recipes or instructions for craft projects are also great for this and also encourage us to read with accuracy
- Try to encourage your child to tackle a longer fiction story. Reading a longer story for pleasure has many benefits. It develops imagination and empathy; it builds reading stamina and introduces new vocabulary and sentence styles
- Although they don't practise phonics, listening to audiobooks does practise comprehension skills and might even encourage your child to read other books for themselves. Listening to books develops imagination, teaches new vocabulary, and allows your child to experience books above their reading age.

PARENT & CARER INFORMATION

Before and After school clubs

Our wrap around care (breakfast and after school club) is prioritised for families who need this support due to work commitments and should therefore not be used as additional playtime.

Other enrichment clubs such as chess, yoga, capoeira, singing, are for children to develop their interests and particular skills.

Behaviour expectations for clubs:

We expect all children to respect adults and behave in line with school policy in clubs, not disrupting the learning in clubs, not hurting others verbally or physically.

Club leader procedures when dealing with behaviour:

- 1st warning parents will be informed when their child has not behaved in line with school expectations.
- 2nd warning parents will be informed again and notified that if this happens again, the child will ne removed from the club.
- On the 3rd communication the parent will be notified that the child can no longer attend this club again (until this is reviewed by SLT)

Late collection from clubs:

By collecting your child late from club, the school is having to pay staff additionally in order to ensure your child is safeguarded during your lateness.

Where you are late for collection from a club, the school will invoice you for another session as we have 2 members of staff to pay as a result of safeguarding procedures.



School Psychology Servive

At APSOL, we work in partnership with the Wandsworth education psychology service (EP), to seek advice and guidance on how best to support children's needs.

Throughout their time at school, some children will need individualised support from an EP - the school will notify you if your child needs this support.

However, sometimes, things happen in our day-to-day, that might impact on the children's emotional wellbeing.

There are resources available for parents/carers to support children with various situations, for example:

- Coping with a major loss
- Helping your child to talk
- Positive play with your child
- Divorce and separation

(We will attach these to this month's newsletter)

We also have an Emotional Literacy Support Assistant (ELSA) who works closely with the EP service and can provide individualised support for children identified as needing this additional level of support. The school ELSA can support the children with their regulation of emotions, anxiety, low self-esteem, anger management difficulties.

If at any point you develop concerns about your child, please speak to Ms Marta, Headteacher or Ms Freya, school senco who can advise on support available.

All children have the right to feel safe and happy at school whether it is in class or in a club.

Clubs are a paid service. If you feel your child's learning is being affected in clubs or you have any concerns, please communicate these with the school or speak to Ms Marta at pick up/ drop off.

We are committed to learning, safeguarding and positive experiences whilst in our care.
